EXETER CITY COUNCIL ACTION MINUTES January 14, 2020

A regular session of the City Council, City of Exeter was held on Tuesday, January 14, 2020, at 7:00 p.m., in the Exeter City Council Chambers, 137 North F Street.

A. CALL TO ORDER REGULAR SESSION

Mayor Waterman-Philpot called the regular session to order at 7:00 p.m.

B. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE AND INVOCATION

Council Member Petty led the Pledge of Allegiance and an invocation was given by Pastor Allen Whittenburg.

C. SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS (if any): None

D. PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Mayor Waterman-Philpot requested those who wish to speak on matters that are not on the agenda that are within the jurisdiction of the Exeter Council, or to address or request a matter be pulled from the consent calendar to do so at this time. She also stated comments related to Individual Business or Public Hearing items that are listed on the agenda will be heard at the time that matter is addressed on the agenda.

There were no public comments presented.

E. CONSENT CALENDAR:

It was moved by Mayor Pro Tem Sally seconded by Council Member Alves and carried 4-0 (Council Member Hails absent) that the items on the Consent Calendar be approved as presented.

Adopt Resolution 2020-01 authorizing the conversion of parking control along the east side of Kaweah Avenue (SR 65), commencing at Sequoia Drive, and continuing north one-hundred and thirty-two (132) feet, and along the west side of Kaweah Avenue (SR 65), commencing at Sequoia Drive, and continuing north one-hundred and forty (140) feet to red curbing no parking or stopping at any time.
- 6. Declare Janice Zigler's seat on the Planning Commission vacant and direct staff to post the vacancy and solicit applications.
- 7. Adopt Resolution 2020-02 establishing requirements and criteria for towing services to enter into agreements with the City for public safety responses and allow the use of multiple tow service companies that have a business location within the City of Exeter.

F.INDIVIDUAL BUSINESS ITEMS

1. Administrative Hearing to consider confirmation of Nuisance Abatement Cost Recovery Amount and Special Assessment Approval for 531 West Firebaugh, Exeter, CA 93221, Assessor's Parcel Number 135-073-014-000. Public Works Director Daymon Qualls provided a report for Council's review and consideration. City Attorney Julia Lew inquired if anyone was present for public comment. Receiving no response, Ms. Lew noted it for the record. With no further discussion it was moved by Council Member Petty, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Sally and carried 4-0 (Council Member Hails absent) to confirm the nuisance abatement recovery amount of \$7,614.95 and to approve the levying of a Special Assessment for that amount on the nuisance property at 531 West Firebaugh Avenue in order to recover the City's costs incurred abating the public nuisances on that parcel.

- 2. Second reading and adoption of Ordinance #691 amending Chapter 3.36.140 to Title 3, Chapter 3.36 of City of Exeter Code of Ordinances, concerning cooperative purchasing, and providing for the utilization of existing purchase contracts competitively bid and awarded by other local, state or federal government agencies read by title only and waiving further reading. Mayor Waterman-Philpot gave second reading of Ordinance #691 by title only and entertained a motion for adoption of Ordinance #691. With no discussion, it was moved by Council Member Alves, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Sally and carried 4-0 (Council Member Hails absent) to give second reading by title only, waiving further reading and adopt Ordinance #691 as presented.
- 3. Authorize two separate one-time expenditures to Aclara of St. Louis, MO;1) \$15,750 for water meter reading implementation services, 2) \$13,954 for water meter data collector unit upgrades and authorize the City Administrator to execute two separate agreements; 1) an agreement with Aclara for automated meter infrastructure (AMI) hosting services and required updates at a monthly fee of \$0.34 per account, which is currently about \$13,784 annually and 2) an agreement with First Response Metering (FRM) of Phoenix, AZ for access to a work order and asset management platform and AMI system support at a monthly fee of \$0.43 per account, which is currently about \$17,347.92 annually. Public Works Director Daymon Qualls provided a report for Council's review and consideration. City Administrator Adam Ennis provided additional information regarding the proposed agreements. Following discussion, it was moved by Council Member Alves seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Sally and carried 4-0 (Council Member Hails absent) to authorize two one-time expenditures of \$15,750 to Aclara for implementation services and \$13,954 to Aclara for data collector unit upgrades and to authorize the City Administrator to execute two separate agreements a) an agreement with Aclara for hosting services and required updates at a monthly fee of \$0.34 per account, which is currently about \$13,784 annually and 2) an agreement with First Response Metering (FRM) for access to a work order and asset management platform and AMI system support at a monthly fee of \$0.43 per account, which is currently about \$17,347.92
- 4. Informational presentations regarding Public Safety and Road Maintenance needs that may be considered as part of the Proposed Revenue Measure. City Administrator Adam Ennis introduced the item and Chief of Police Hall. Chief Hall provided a PowerPoint presentation highlighting a breakdown of the needs of the Exeter Police Department. Chief Hall, Mr. Ennis and City Attorney Julia responded to questions posed by Council. Mr. Ennis provided a PowerPoint presentation highlighting road maintenance needs in the City of Exeter. Following brief discussion, no action was requested, or taken.

G. CITY COUNCIL ITEMS OF INTEREST

Council Member Alves reported on upcoming meetings he will be attending this week. Mayor Pro Tem Sally reported on attending the Greater Kaweah GSA meeting and reported on recent events she attended.

H. CITY ADMINISTRATOR/DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

City Administrator Adam Ennis reported on a valve break on Firebaugh and advised the repair has been completed. He further reported the City received authorization to proceed with the bid on the Palm Street project, the status of the water bond financing, potential for sewer bond financing, and introduced Eekhong See who was recently promoted to Financial Analyst for the City's Finance Department.

The California Transportation Commission (CTC) is responsible for programming and allocating funds for the construction of highway, passenger rail, transit and active transportation improvements throughout California. Summary/Background:

Description of Code Enforcement Actions

The Nuisance Property (240 South Orange Avenue) is a single–family residential structure with a front yard fence that encircles the front perimeter of the Nuisance Property and did not comply with City standards. The Nuisance Property has been a subject of City code enforcement efforts since July 2019. The record owners of the Nuisance Property are Christopher Williams and Jacquelyn M. Williams ("Owners").

The Nuisance Property was brought to the attention of Code Enforcement in July 2019 after City staff observed an unpermitted fence in the front yard that did not comply with City standards. The fence exceeded the City's height limit, lacked proper structural integrity, and did not conform to the requirements of the Exeter Municipal Code (EMC). The fence was unsafe and unsightly.

On July 26, 2019, the City issued a Notice of Public Nuisance Declaration ("Nuisance Declaration") informing the Owners that the City declared the fence to be a public nuisance that must be abated by repair, rehabilitation, demolition, or removal. The Nuisance Declaration informed the Owners that repair or removal of the fence must be completed by August 9, 2019 in accordance with EMC standards, and advised that failure to abate the fence by the specified date would result in the City seeking authority to abate the fence at the Owners' expense pursuant to EMC sections 8.24.100, 15.36.030, and 17.10.05(F).

City Administrator (Initials Required) On September 2, 2019, the City sent a letter to the Owners ("City's First Letter") which stated that the City would move forward with inspections, citations, and abatement if there was not full compliance. The City suggested that the Owners meet with City officials to explore various options to bring the fence into full compliance. The City also issued the Owners an Administrative Citation in the amount of \$100 for the unlawful fence.

On October 4, 2019, after an inspection of the Nuisance Property, the City sent the Owners a second letter ("City's Second Letter") informing them that while minor modifications had been made to the fence, it was still in violation of the EMC. The City's Second Letter stated that the City would proceed with obtaining an abatement warrant authorizing the City to enter and abate the nuisance condition if not remedied by October 14, 2019 in accordance with the EMC standards. The City further advised that if the unlawful fence was not abated, legal proceedings would begin on October 15, 2019, and all costs, including City, County, and legal fees, would become the personal liability of the Owners and a special assessment on the Nuisance Property. The City received no response from the Owners.

On November 13, 2019, the City conducted a follow up inspection of the Nuisance Property and observed that the violation remained. The Nuisance Declaration, City's First Letter, Administrative Citation, and City's Second Letter provided the Owners with more than sufficient notice and opportunity to bring the unlawful fence into compliance, yet they deliberately chose to remain noncompliant to the detriment of the surrounding community.

Due to the Owners' lack of cooperation and compliance with the City's remediation directive, the City expended considerable time and resources addressing the violation. Ultimately, the City was forced to seek an Abatement Warrant to abate the nuisance violation on the Nuisance Property. It was determined that unless the City took action, the unlawful condition on the Nuisance Property would continue to persist.

Thus, on November 21, 2019, the City obtained an Abatement Warrant to enter the front yard of the Nuisance Property and abate the fence violation. On November 27, 2019, pursuant to the Abatement Warrant, a Public Works Department employee and an Exeter Police Officer posted the Abatement Notice on the Nuisance Property providing the Owners with 72 hours advance notice of the execution of the Abatement Warrant, thus, providing the Owners with even further opportunity to bring the fence into compliance.

On December 2, 2019, pursuant to the Abatement Warrant, officials from the Exeter Police Department and Public Works Department abated the identified nuisance condition on the Nuisance Property. During the execution of the Abatement Warrant, City staff made every effort to be courteous to the Owners.

After successful execution of the Abatement Warrant, the City now seeks to resolve this matter by recovering the nuisance abatement costs the City and the public were forced to incur to abate the nuisance condition on the Nuisance Property, as authorized by the California Government Code and the EMC.

Statutory Cost Recovery Rights & Cost Recovery Amount

The City is entitled to reimbursement of its nuisance abatement enforcement costs through a special assessment on the Nuisance Property. Government Code section 38773.5 and EMC section 8.24.130 authorize the levying of a special assessment against the Nuisance Property for recovery of the City's and the public's nuisance abatement costs they were forced to incur due to the interested parties' failure to maintain and expeditiously rehabilitate the Nuisance Property. By statute, a special assessment becomes a personal obligation of the property

owners and a super-priority lien on the Nuisance Property. (Gov. Code, §§ 38773.5, 53935; Rev. & Tax. Code, § 2192.1; EMC, § 8.24.130.)

The City's unpaid abatement costs in this matter total \$4,466.90.

Explanation of Costs

The City conducted preliminary assessment research to analyze abatement options for the Nuisance Property. The City's costs incurred in this matter include, but are not limited to: the nuisance investigation; verifications of the nuisance fence condition; analysis of the severity of the violation; assessment of the City's nuisance abatement options; consultation with the City Prosecutor's Office regarding the legal process and abatement options; conducting an abatement feasibility analysis; preparing the abatement warrant packet; obtaining the Abatement Warrant from the court; preparation, mailing, and posting notice of the execution of the Abatement Warrant; conducting multiple inspections of the Nuisance Property to identify, verify, and confirm the full extent of the violation of law; issuance of notices of violation, the Nuisance Declaration, the administrative citation, and the notice of intent to abate; communications with the Owners to gain compliance; communication with different agencies such as the Exeter Police Department and the Exeter Public Works Department to coordinate execution of the Abatement Warrant; and ongoing communications with the City Prosecutor's Office regarding due process, disposal of property, mitigation of loss, limitations of abatement, and protecting and securing the City's cost recovery rights.

The City prepared an abatement warrant application packet consisting of an application, a memorandum of points and authorities, a declaration by the City inspector, a proposed warrant, a warrant execution notice, and a warrant return. The abatement warrant packet was submitted to the court for approval. The Abatement Warrant was then noticed and executed. In executing the Abatement Warrant, the City coordinated with various agencies, including the Public Works Department, the Exeter Police Department, and Visalia Animal Control in order to ensure availability and attendance at the abatement and delegation and division of labor during the abatement process.

During the abatement, officials from the Exeter Police Department, the Public Works Department, and Visalia Animal Control documented, photographed, and abated the fence violation on the Nuisance Property. Upon completion of the abatement, the City prepared, filed, and submitted the warrant return to the court. Upon completion of the abatement, the City proceeded with this action to recover the public's nuisance abatement costs incurred.

For this cost recovery action, the City prepared, mailed, and posted the Cost Recovery Invoice ("Invoice") informing all interested parties that the City seeks recovery of its costs incurred in the nuisance abatement action against the Nuisance Property. The City also obtained a Property Detail Report and a copy of the Grant Deed. The Invoice listed the date, time, and place of this City Council Administrative Hearing and identified the amount the City seeks to confirm as a special assessment on the Nuisance Property.

All the costs incurred by the City in this nuisance abatement action were reasonable, and were solely necessitated by the interested parties' failure to maintain and expeditiously rehabilitate the Nuisance Property. Property owners and interested parties have a legal obligation to maintain their private property and to keep it safe, such that it does not present a danger to the community. If the City is forced to invest public resources to pursue abatement of nuisances on private property, the public is entitled to recover those nuisance abatement and enforcement costs. Failure to recover those costs would double victimize the community by making the public pay for the enforcement action to alleviate the dangerous nuisance conditions to which

the community was the victim, and would be tantamount to a gift of public funds for the improvement of private property benefiting those uncooperative property owners. Accordingly, the City hereby requests that the City Council confirm and approve the recovery of the City's nuisance abatement costs in this matter in the amount of **\$4,466.90** and approve the levying of that amount as a special assessment on the Nuisance Property.

Fiscal Impact: This action will reimburse the City for all the public's costs incurred as a part of the City's nuisance abatement enforcement against the Nuisance Property. The recovery of nuisance abatement costs is critical to the City's long-term ability to protect the public from the development of dangerous nuisance conditions on private property, to protect the public's use and enjoyment of their property in the City, and to protect the safety, aesthetics, and property values of real property throughout the City. The City only pursues nuisance abatement enforcement actions as a last resort after the interested parties have been notified, given an opportunity to voluntarily cure the violations, and have proven uncooperative to the point of the public's detriment.

Summary/Background:

At the December 10, 2019 meeting, Council directed staff to begin developing a community group to receive staff presentations regarding potential details of a proposed revenue measure and City department needs that could be funded by the measure. Staff developed an information sheet and application for the community group, placed them on the City website and Facebook page and presented them to community groups in person and through email.

The information sheet presented the purpose of the group, organization and anticipated schedule of meetings and topics to be discussed. The schedule was developed to keep any proposed revenue measure on track for ballot language to be submitted to Tulare County by the end of June 2020 if the community and Council chose to do so. Applications were due to the City Clerk's office by January 24, 2020 so that they could be assembled and brought to the City Council for consideration on January 28, 2020. Council can review applications and direct staff on their preference for committee member selections and moving forward.

There were 6 applications received by the deadline and will be presented to the Council with this item. In addition to committee conduct and rules information, staff presentations containing the same information as presented to Council, other than additional background information, is anticipated to be presented to the group every Wednesday night beginning February 5, 2020 and ending March 11, 2020, unless an extension is need. The committee Chair and Chair Pro-Tem would then discuss and present their recommendation at a regular Council meeting.

The committee meetings would be conducted in accordance with the Brown Act, being open to the public and public comment with agendas posted a minimum of 72 hours in advance. The parliamentary procedure followed by the committee would be the Robert's Rules of Order.

Fiscal Impact: None for this item. Fiscal impact of a Proposed Revenue Measure will be developed as the details of the measure are determined.

Prior Council/Board Actions: Various previous Council discussions and direction on developing the Proposed Revenue Measure. Public Safety and Road Maintenance needs were presented at the January 14, 2020 Council meeting.

CITY OF EXETER 2020 PROPOSED REVENUE MEASURE ADVISORY COMMITTEE RULES AND PROCEDURES

PURPOSE AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

The purpose and responsibilities of this Committee are as follows:

- To provide a community review of available information received from City staff, and to provide recommendations to the City Council regarding a proposed revenue measure.
- To review current City services and associated needs and budgets from City staff presentations and additional public information requested by the Committee/Members
- To receive analysis from City staff regarding the varying levels of service and their costs, and consider the levels of service desired by the community in conjunction with those associated costs
- To consider the need for additional revenue to provide the level of service desired by the community
- To, if community-desired levels of service required increased revenue, consider
 potential details of a revenue measure, such as type, amount, initial expenditure plan
 and/or guidelines, and future oversight
- To provide a recommendation to the City Council regarding the need for and potential details of a revenue measure

CAPACITY:

The Committee shall serve solely in an advisory capacity to the City Council.

COMPOSITION:

The Committee shall consist of up to fifteen (15) members. The final Member count shall be confirmed by the City Council. Committee members shall be appointed by the City Council at its complete discretion. Members shall be residents of the City, an employee or owner of a business in the City, an owner of real property in the City, or regularly conduct business in the City. No member shall be a council member, officer, or employee of the City. The Members shall not be compensated for their services.

COMMITTEE/MEMBERS TERM:

The Committee is formed for a limited time period, and the Committee will disestablish as of the date the City Council adopts a Resolution ordering the submission of a proposition for a revenue measure to the qualified voters of the City (if any), or upon action of the City Council to disestablish the Committee, whichever occurs first. All Committee members shall serve at the pleasure of the City Council and may be removed by Council action at any time and for any reason. Vacancies, if filled, shall be filled by appointment by the Council.

MEETINGS AND RECORDS:

The Committee shall meet every Wednesday at 6:00 p.m. at City Hall beginning February 5, 2020 through March 11, 2020, and every Wednesday for additional weeks if authorized by the City Council. Additional Committee meetings may be scheduled upon request to and approval by the City Council.

The Committee shall appoint two of its members as Committee Co-Chairpersons to manage the meetings and present recommendations to the City Council. A presence of a majority of the members of the final Member count established by the City Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Committee Meetings shall be open and public, and are subject to the California Brown Act. Additionally, the Committee's proceedings are subject to the California Public Records Act and the California Political Reform Act. By accepting appointment, each Member agrees to comply with Government Code 1090 et seq. and the California Political Reform Act and to complete the Form 700 to the extent required by law. The Committee shall follow Robert's Rules of Order with regard to the conduct of its meetings.

A City staff liaison will provide the Committee with technical assistance and support as needed, including preparation of and posting required public notices; providing a meeting room and any necessary audio visual equipment; preparing and copying documentary materials, such as agendas and reports; retaining public records and providing all necessary public access; and attending Committee meetings and proceedings.

Summary/Background:

There have been multiple proposed plans and improvements discussed in the past regarding SR65 from SR198 to Lindsay, including the Kaweah Drive/Spruce Road Corridor. These discussions have included the option of shifting SR65 from Kaweah Avenue to Spruce Road. It is likely any improvements for this corridor would be completed in phases, so Caltrans has recently updated an Intersection Operational Analysis and Intersection Control Evaluation (ICE) for the SR198/SR245 intersection. In 2017 this intersection accommodated about 17,700 vehicles per day with a truck volume between 8 and 18 percent. The Tulare County Association of Governments (TCAG) has requested that the City review the analysis and proposed improvements and provide comments.

The purpose of the analysis was to evaluate improvement options for the intersection based on current and future projections of operations and traffic. The analysis basically concluded that the current operation of the signal will be failing with the projected traffic by 2025 and that improvements will be required to keep the intersection operating at an acceptable level of service in the future beyond 2025. Two alternative improvements were evaluated two improve future performance of the intersection with increased future traffic,1) traffic signal control with widening and adding north-south left turn lanes, and 2) a two-lane hybrid roundabout. A single-lane roundabout was initially evaluated but could not accommodate the future traffic volume.

Both options evaluated provide acceptable levels of service at 2025 and 2045, with the roundabout outperforming the traffic signal. The estimated costs for each alternative are nearly the same at about \$6.8 million and a projected life savings from reduced traffic delays of about \$10.5 Million for the traffic signal option and \$12 million for the roundabout. The benefit/cost (B/C) ratio for the traffic signal was 1.56 and for the roundabout 1.78. A safety performance B/C ratio for the roundabout was 1.62 with no credit for the traffic signal upgrade.

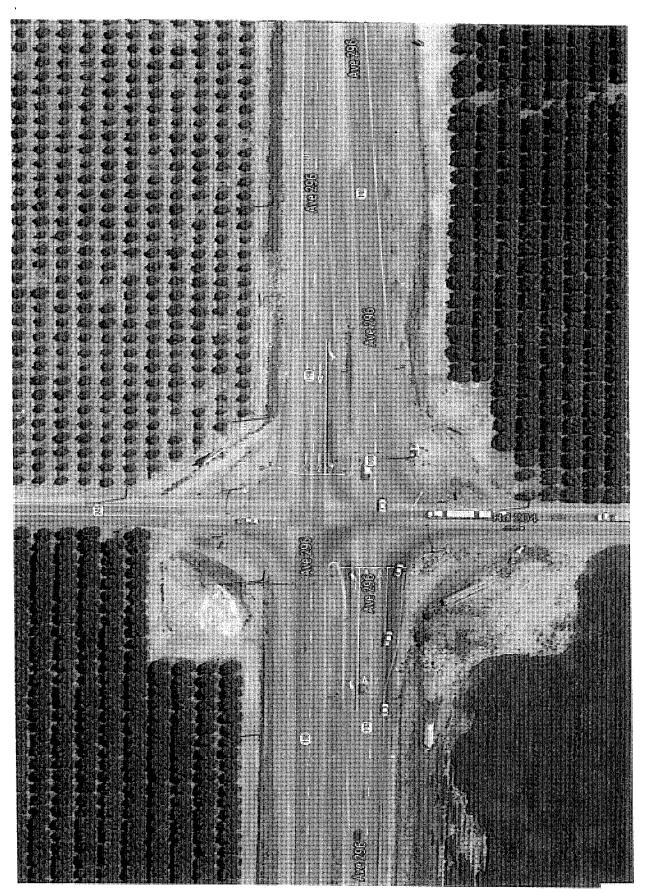
